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The latest "standard" SSD layout is as follows.
The "BIOS boot partition" may well not be required as grub2 data is probably located in sectors 34 -> 2047
The separate /boot partition (sda3) may well not be used.

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If the UEFI does not "see" the SSD then check the status of the Protective MBR boot flag using gdisk/fdisk

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To discover how the machine was booted
1. Check grub menu entries for linux16 or linuxefi
2. When booted in UEFI mode efibootmgr will provide relevant information
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To ensure that the device will run on the widest range of machines

To force an existing kernel to use a "fully configured" initramfs file then
dracut --regenerate-all --force
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Creation of an SSD (USB or SATA) device that will boot on both BIOS and UEFI based machines.

It is now known how the fedora installer determines which boot mechanism to use.
The type of install is determined by the way the distribution stick is booted.

Once a bootable installation has been achieved (BIOS or UEFI) the "alternative" boot mechanism
can be installed. Both of the possibilities described below have been well tested.
Triple check the correct device name at all stages, /dev/sda is assumed below.

Case 1: The machine has booted from a BIOS install

Case 2: The machine has booted from a UEFI install

*When a kernel update occurs the appropriate grub.cfg may require re-generation.
This has been tested when booted using both UEFI & BIOS. No changes are necessary as both grub.cfg files
are updated and include the correct entries for linux[efi | 16] and initrd[efi | 16].

BIOS:  /boot/grub2/grub.cfg          linux & initrd
EFI:   /boot/efi/EFI/fedora/grub.cfg  linux & initrdefi  [/dev/sdb2 is mounted at /boot/efi]
This changes after a dnf kernel update!
BIOS:  /boot/grub2/grub.cfg          linux & initrd          [for the latest kernel]
EFI:   /boot/efi/EFI/fedora/grub.cfg  linuxefi & initrdefi  [for the latest kernel]
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If you want to manually provide redundant EFI system partitions (no RAID1), all you need to do is run
efibootmgr to add a second entry. You don't need to install grub2-efi-modules or run grub2-install. Use:
efibootmgr -c -w -L 'CentOS Linux' -d /dev/sdb -p 1 -l 'EFI\centos\shim.efi'
... where the option to -d is the name of the drive containing the EFI system partition and the
option to -p is the EFI system partition number.
For reference, that command will appear in /var/log/anaconda/program.log after any normal installation.
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
